Pastor Kent

"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us..." (John 1:14 ESV)

I always remember how, after Easter one year, I received one of those anonymous notes that every pastor loves to receive (note my sarcasm). I assume it was anonymous because the person didn't want to raise this issue with me directly. In fact, they didn't even want me to know who they were. But they wanted to make their feelings known.

In this note, I was asked why we talk about the same thing every year. The implication was that this person wanted to hear something different on Easter Sunday. Now, obviously, I didn't preach the same sermon every year. But every year, on Easter, I did talk about the resurrection.

And why wouldn't I. Easter is a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus. Christ's resurrection is the entire reason for the holiday. But this does bring up a good point that we should consider.

It's important that we're reminded on a regular basis of what God has done for us. This is the entire point of our holidays in the church. This is the entire point of the church year. It's a continual reminder to us of the fact that God sent his Son into the world to redeem us from sin and death.

The church year begins with Advent, when we're reminded of the promised coming of Jesus. We remember how the people waited for the coming of the Savior. Then, on Christmas, we're reminded of his birth. In between the major holidays, there are remembrances of Jesus' life and ministry. During Lent, we're reminded of the events leading up to Jesus' sacrifice. We remember his suffering. On Maundy Thursday, we remember the Last Supper. On Good Friday, we remember Jesus' death. And on Easter, we remember how we rose from the dead. We then

come to Pentecost, when we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the church, empowering them to carry out the call Jesus had given them. Throughout the summer and early fall, we remember the life of Christ and his teachings. And, at the end of the church year, we remember the promise of Jesus' return.

You may have noticed that, throughout the Old Testament, the Jews had a series of holidays as well. And each of these holidays were a reminder to the people of what God had done for them. They were a reminder of how he'd redeemed them from slavery in Egypt and brought them into the Promised Land.

When you look at their lives, it seems that this reminder was important. Even with the holidays, and even with the constant reminders, they continued to drift away from the Lord. They continued to place their faith in other gods or even in men.

The same thing is true for us. It's easy enough for us to get so caught up in our day to day life that we forget the Lord and what he's done for us. We forget to look to him as new needs arise. It's also easy for us to begin trusting in other sources for the blessings we need.

These annual reminders pull us back. As we celebrate, the Lord's salvation is brought back into our mind. And we're encouraged, once again, to trust in him and to look to him as our source of blessing.

It's hard to believe, but here we are at the beginning of Advent. Our Thanksgiving celebration is behind us and we're looking forward to Christmas. And, as we see in the above verse, we're reminded of the fact that the Word became flesh. We're reminded of the fact that the Son of God took on flesh and that he was born as a baby. We're reminded of the fact that he was born to save us from our sin.

We often hear the phrase repeated, this time of year, that Jesus is the reason for the season. This will be our focus at Prince of Peace throughout the season of Advent. Each Sunday, we'll look at a different aspect of the Christmas message. And we'll be reminded of the great

blessing of his coming into the world. I hope that you'll worship regularly with us and receive this reminder of the great hope we've been given.

Sunday School Corner

December is always a busy month for our Sunday School Students and this year will be no different. Our Christmas Program is December 13th during the worship service. In order to get ready for it there are a few important dates to remember.

- December 6th the students will spend the entire Sunday School class hour practicing.
- December 12th there will be a morning practice. Grades 3rd-6th should be at the church by 9:00 A.M. with PreK-2nd arriving at church at 10:00 A.M. The practice will be a full dress rehearsal and last until noon.
- On day of the program (13th)
 all Sunday School students should be at
 church by 8:40 in order to get ready for
 the program.

It is important that all students attend these practices. Practice time is very limited! Another note for parents of 3 year olds-they will not be participating in the Christmas program.

After the Christmas Program Sunday School will be on break until January 10th.

Operation Christmas Child was a huge success and we are already looking forward to next year. There is a special section this month in the Newsletter devoted to it. A special thank you to all those who participated. I know that our youth loved to do it. Starting in January look for a special section detailing kits and different ideas for OCC Boxes next year.

Sunday School Christmas Program will be December 13 during the worship service.

Thank you so much to each and every one of you who donated items for Operation Christmas Child this past year! To us, items such as pencil sharpeners, candy, toothbrushes, washcloths and stuffed animals seem so simple. And yet, to the children who receive these shoeboxes – some of them for the first time seeing bubble gum or candy canes and having their very own washcloth – these simple shoebox gifts plant a seed of faith that forever changes them. The Lord uses these simple, ordinary gifts to open a door to the Gospel and to bring children and their families to faith in Jesus.

This year, as in years past, we collected items through the year for Operation Christmas Child. But this year, there was a twist – a good twist! When Sunday School started up, children and adults were challenged each Sunday to bring specific items to fill shoeboxes. As a church family, we packed boxes together during the Sunday School hour on November 8. The result was 132 shoeboxes packed! Combine that with boxes that member of the congregation packed *outside* the packing party and we had 145 shoebox gifts this year! That means 145 children will receive a shoebox gift, be blessed by the simple yet loving contents, hear the good news of Jesus Christ, and have an opportunity to be trained further in His Word!

Please keep these boxes and the children who will receive them in your prayers in the days and weeks and months to come. It is easy for us to get excited about the packing and the sending and then go on with everyday life. But these boxes will make an eternal impact and plant seeds that need our prayers to grow and bear fruit.

At our packing party, it was wonderful to see the older kids paired up with younger ones, helping them to assemble their boxes; as well as adults walking side by side with children helping them pick items to fill their shoebox. My hope is to see even more adult involvement in the packing next year. (Yes that means you, even though you may not attend Sunday School!) The bar has been set high – do you think we can do MORE boxes next year?

Lord willing, I say absolutely!

"And not only this, but we also exult in our tribulations, knowing that tribulation brings about perseverance; and perseverance, proven character; and proven character, hope; and hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to us." —Romans 5:3-5

Over the past week (at the time of my writing of this article), youtube, Do it best, and I have become very good friends. Over this time frame, I embarked on a journey that ended up being much more involved than I anticipated; I began a plumbing project. All I had to do was to switch out a leaky drain from the bathtub with a new non-leaky drain. Simple right? That is what youtube showed me anyways. So, with my confidence quite high, I marched into my bathroom on Monday afternoon with Ezekiel, my helper for the day, right behind. After watching how simple this project was, even seeing how easy the next step could be if the all-important cross bars in the bottom of the drain broke during the first attempt, I was thinking we could be done in 30 minutes or so. Not too bad.

I gathered the tools in the tub, Zeke bringing his own to assist with as well, and started to attempt to unscrew the drain. To no real surprise to me, the cross bars did indeed break apart and I began attempting the other methods I had observed to loosen the drain. So, bringing out my hacksaw, screwdriver, and hammer, I donned my ear muffs and began the second method. It wasn't as quick as the first method would have been, but I started to make some progress as the drain slowly but surely began to turn. By this point, I could tell that it was going to be a much longer endeavor than 30

minutes, so I sent Zeke to play with Micaiah and mommy in the living room.

I'm not sure how long I pounded, but I fairly quickly became aware of another problem. The drain was turning, but it wasn't unthreading at all. It turns out that there was a nut below the tub keeping it in place. This was discovered later in the evening over a video chat with my brother Jeremy who has some experience with construction and plumbing. Armed with this new information, I began again the important work of fixing that drain. However, that new knowledge wasn't immediately fruitful. I soon discovered that my tools were not very adequate to the task, but still I persevered and muscled through it. Finally, the old drain was off.

Before I was able to cheer, I did a quick survey of the damage that was done to the existing plumbing and realized that I needed some new parts. This part of the job is called "back and forth" and is when Do it Best and I became friends. I got what I thought I needed, put the drain together, turned on the water, and found a leak. That was when I discovered that some of the internal parts were not sufficient. I purchased new parts, got back to work, and soon decided that having the appropriate tools would be a good idea...off to the store again. Once back, I threw things back together and was finally met with some initial success. At this point, most of the water was staying in the drain. Tonight, I hope to make my final adjustment and be done with it. In hindsight, maybe the slow leak from the stopper wasn't so bad.

I'm not going to say otherwise, this project was a hassle. But in that hassle, I learned some things, grew, and discovered that I am slowly becoming more handy around the house. In a spiritual sense, I think we may also be guilty of avoiding some of the trials, upsets, and seeming failures in our walk of faith. We feel like we may not know exactly what we are doing when we embark on the life of doing the works God has made us for, and therefore we leave it up to the "experts" to do it. Friends, when we do that, we don't grow. In the passage from Romans, we see that trials that are worked through lead to great things. Let us not too hastily take a pass on doing the work of the Lord; we

don't want to pass up those opportunities to grow and be blessed.
