"...give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."
(1Thessalonians 5:18 ESV)

As November begins, thoughts of Thanksgiving enter the mind. This is a holiday that we all enjoy and that most of us find very meaningful. We enjoy the time with family and friends. Without question, we enjoy the food. And we recognize the importance of offering thanks to God, who has given us all that we have.

It's often frustrating to look at our society and to see the sense of entitlement that fills the hearts of many. They feel that they're deserving of the blessings they've received and those they desire. So, instead of giving thanks, they're continually looking for more. Instead of expressing

gratefulness for the provision of God, they grumble and complain about the things they lack.

This is an attitude with which we all struggle to some degree. We find it hard to give thanks in all circumstances, as directed by Paul. We find it hard to give thanks in all circumstances, even if it is the will of God. We find this difficult because not all of our circumstances are pleasant.

When confronted with situations that are challenging, when confronted with hardship, our first reaction is to ask God why he would allow such a thing in our life. In the moment, we don't see a reason to be grateful. In fact, we often find in it cause to accuse God.

We accuse God of being unloving. We accuse him of injustice. We accuse him because we don't think ourselves worthy of such experiences.

We fail to remember that we're not deserving of any of the blessings God has bestowed upon us or those that he has to offer. Because of our sin, the only thing of which we're deserving is death and condemnation. Yet, in spite of this, God

has done everything necessary to provide for us the forgiveness of sins and eternity in a place where the evils of this life are no more.

We also fail to realize that, even in our bad experiences, God is working for our blessing. In Romans 8:28 Paul says: *"And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose."* It doesn't say that everything that happens to us is good. But, in all things, God is able to work for our good.

Sometimes, in hindsight, we may come to understand how God was using a hardship for our blessing. In other cases, we may never fully understand. But, as believers, we have this confidence and hope.

In Romans 5, Paul tells us that we can rejoice in our sufferings. We can do so knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope. God works through our sufferings to strengthen us. He works through our sufferings to transform us. He uses suffering to build within us a confident expectation that everything he's promised will come to pass.

So as we approach Thanksgiving, and as we celebrate this meaningful holiday, let us give thanks in all circumstances. Let us give thanks knowing the great blessing that God has in store for us. Let us give thanks knowing that, no matter how things may seem, he's working for our good. And let us give thanks knowing that God will use even our struggles to draw us closer to himself.

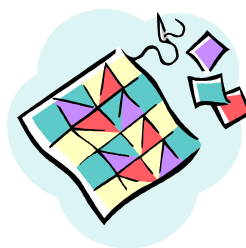

Sunday School Corner

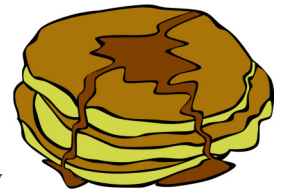

November 1 – hard candies,

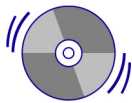
November 8 – shoe boxes, clear totes – PACKING DAY

Why We Don't Care

“For this reason God will send upon them a deluding influence so that they will believe what is false, in order that they all may be judged who did not believe the truth, but took pleasure in wickedness.

—2 Thessalonians 2:11-12

There are some things in our country and church (body of Christ in this nation...not just the body at Prince of Peace) that make me terribly sad. One of those things is how quickly we can move past something we encounter that is so terrible and wrong and get back to football, facebook, fiction, and all sorts of other things that consume our “normal” days.

As an example of this phenomenon, consider with me the multiple movies that came out in the past months regarding Planned Parenthood and the sale of baby body parts ‘harvested’ after abortions for research. First, the public outcry was pretty noticeable. People were upset and were not afraid to share their views on the matter. It was a shock to our system that not only is the abortion industry in our nation murdering these precious lives that were made in the image of God just as much as you and I, but that there was the possibility that this organization was altering procedures to maximize profitable harvest potential from these brutalized corpses. It was outrageous, astounding, and regardless if it ended up being legal or not, was morally bankrupt.

Time passed and more videos came out with more detail. Then another one, and another one. People rose in defense of P.P. claiming that the footage was highly edited and fabricated, they proclaimed how significant the work of P.P. was, and touted the rights of women to slay whatever life could be inside of them. As these messages spread, we zoned out. New videos were

released and we didn’t bother to watch them because we already knew what was in them...and we didn’t have time to let our lives get messy with such a contentious issue. Eventually, we blocked out the issue all together and continue on as if nothing really happened.

News Flash, babies are still being MURDERED every day...and we don’t care. Sure, we can have token expressions of support for pro-life ministries...give once a year to make us feel better...but babies are being killed every day, not just once a year. How can this be? How would the world have reacted in the 1940’s if similar video footage was leaked regarding Nazi prison and death camps? Do you think we would have become as quickly apathetic about that plight as we have about the unborn? I think not.

So why is this our sad reality? Consider the passage at the beginning of the article. In this passage, Paul writes to the church in Thessalonica about what it will be like as we near the end of days. He warns that God will orchestrate the mass delusion of a society that will call evil good and good evil. He writes that they will “t[ake] pleasure in wickedness”. Does this fit what we see in our world? Do we have modern examples of people declaring what God has considered wicked to be actually good...even going as far as speaking on God’s behalf (apart from His Word) saying that He would undoubtedly support these things too? We are called to be His salt and light in this world which means that we are not called to be comfortable, but to defend the weak and speak for the powerless. We have seen the world around us; it might be time for us to get a little more salty.

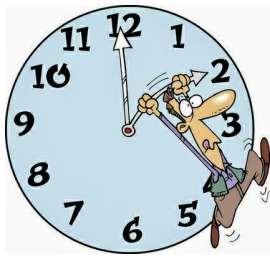

Men's Breakfast/Bible Study

Pastor Kent is leading the study titled: "*Joshua - Becoming a Man of Valor*." The first study started on Sept. 26. There were 9 men who attended the first study which is held in the POP fellowship room.

Advent Services

Pastor Kent offered, but after discussion the deacons have decided there will be no Advent services this year. The deacons have decided to not stop the Wednesday evening bible study during Advent season. Advent services, in the past have not been well attended. It was noted that when stopping the Wednesday evening bible study for Advent services, the bible study momentum drastically declined after the classes resumed.

Trustee's Report – Jason Mohl

1. Crack sealing project. Belzona crack sealing project. About 60% done. We need at least 3 people to do this work and it takes about 2-3 hours each time we do this due to product priming and curing time.
2. Handicap door closers up date. Door openers are here but not installed.
3. Concrete Project for East side of buildings including new dumpster pad is finished. Bob will

check into hand railing for south east handicap entrance.

4. Outdoor Bell Ringing System. Bids were received for electronic clapper and were quite expensive. Jim mentioned possibility of just getting a wifi enabled speaker system to broadcast bell sounds and music.

5. Lawn Mowing update. Sprinkler system was drained by Garner Sailer. Some sprinkler heads need replacing but will be done in the spring.

Christian Ed Report – Michelle Klaudt

1. 1st day SS: Bells at the last 15 min. went fantastic! Twyla asked for another set to be ordered. Opening went great. Rebecah will explain where the offering goes, go over rules again, and make up a song book. Grades 3-6 will need to congregate in library before going to hand bells to limit distractions for adult study.

2. Christmas program: Angie had some great ideas! including have everything dark, 6th graders do the scripture reading, kinds in play carry candles and add light as play goes on, sing a few traditional songs. Also discussed was to decorate the fellowship hall for a birthday party when we have b-day cake during fellowship and instead of handing out treat bags, give something different like bracelet or cup with trinkets.

OLD BUSINESS

Building Project Update - The carpet was ordered for the council room. Need to get the altar railing finished and installed for safety.

NEW BUSINESS

Trunk or Treat at POP on October 31, 2015 from 4:30 to 7:30 will be held with Christian Ed chairing the event. They will need lots of help for the event.

Hand rail for east side of church – We will purchase a hand rail that's made out of plastic so it won't rust.

Pastor Appreciation month – We will give Pastor Kent and Jordan a cash gift in appreciation for their ministry work here at POP.
