# **Pastor Kent**

"Look: I, Paul, say to you that if you accept circumcision, Christ will be of no advantage to you." (Galatians 5:2 ESV)

In the modern evangelical church, we are quick to confess that we are saved by the grace of God alone through faith in Christ alone. And this has also been the position of the historic Lutheran Church. We believe, teach, and confess that we play no role in our salvation. It's the work of God from first to last.

That being said, although most of us do trust in Christ, we don't stop there. We continue to believe that something, along with Jesus, works to accomplish our salvation. We don't truly believe that Jesus is sufficient.

This is also what was going on among the Galatians. False teachers had come into the church claiming that, in addition to Jesus, the people had

to be circumcised if they were to be saved. They taught that the people had to follow the Law of Moses if they were to be saved.

Paul stood firmly against this teaching. He told them that, if they accepted circumcision, Christ would be of no advantage to them. He went on to say, in verse 4, that those who sought to be justified by the law are severed from Christ.

Christ alone saves. And we cannot add anything to it. Once we begin thinking that it's Jesus plus this or Jesus plus that, we are lost.

Circumcision isn't an issue in our day, at least not in a spiritual sense. However, many other things are. Many of us believe, for example, that Jesus plus abstaining from alcohol saves. Many of us believe that Jesus plus speaking in tongues saves. Many of us believe that Jesus plus a strict ten percent tithe saves. And many of us believe that Jesus plus an hour-long daily devotional time saves. There are countless examples we could cite, but you get the point. Each of us has to search our own heart to see what we're depending on in addition to Jesus. However, the point Paul is making remains the same.

If we trust in anything in addition to Christ, we are believing a corrupted version of the gospel. If we trust in anything in addition to Christ, he will be of no advantage to us. If we trust in anything in addition to Jesus, we are severed from Christ.

Yes, many activities flow from our faith in Christ. Many changes in our life result from our faith in Christ. But they are just that...results of our faith. They are the byproduct of our faith. These are not the things that save us. And they are not where justification is found.

May we, then, trust in Christ alone for our salvation. May we look to him, and to nothing else, for the forgiveness we so desperately need. May we truly believe that his sacrifice is sufficient.



## **Pastoral Intern Kevin Hall**

1 John 3:14 (ESV) "We know that we have passed out of death into life, because we love the brothers. Whoever does not love abides in death."

First John is a fun book to read, but it's also tremendously challenging. A lot of the book reminds us that faith is not just having the knowledge that Jesus existed and died for my sins, but also following His Lordship and allowing His Holy Spirit to do His work on my heart. I can remember one of the first times I read this book, and this passage specifically, and wondering how in the world I would ever be able to do what John's calling for because I knew that often my heart is not full of love. Maybe it's because it's my personal experience, but I think that is something we all can relate too. First, it should be noted that we will always love imperfectly, but while that should be noted, the Bible is teaching us here that we should not be content with that. When we are content with that, or when we allow ourselves the license to not love, that is when we are remaining in death. Don't remain in death. It's a very bad idea. Secondly though, the Holy Spirit creates the capacity to love in our hearts as our relationship with Him grows. As we meet God in His Word and we respond to Him in prayer, worship and vocation, He creates in us a new heart willing and able to love our brothers.

The fact that John here is focusing on love for our brothers is also significant. He's talking about love for our fellow Christians, and no-where are our fellow Christians more accessible (and in need of) for us to love than in our local congregations. But here's the phenomenal part about that: John says, it's in those moments that we know we are alive. Ponder that for a second- It's when we love our brothers and sisters in the local congregation that we are given the gift of experiencing life. I doubt very much that many of us think of "our best life now" as opening our homes for a Bible study, or making brownies for a funeral, or going into the church on a Saturday to refill candles, but it really is. Congregational life, where we gather together and show love to one another, is the very experience of life eternal, begun now. And praise God who gave us His Son, His Word and the Sacraments it institutes which all make our cold stony hearts living and loving hearts of flesh, to make it all possible.



I have a busy week ahead of me, but I know that I can prepare for family camp after I get back from helping my family, so that's what I'm going to do. Otherwise I won't be any good to my family because I will be stressing out too much about the coming days that I won't be able to help them at all. It's not bad to have a busy schedule, it's bad to let your busy schedule control you. That's why we take things one at a time, so that we can do them to the best of our ability for God (Col 3:23)



# COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

#### President's Report - Del Schnaidt

I read an article recently written by Max Lucado which points out some helpful suggestions that I felt worthwhile to share with council and the congregation.

Are you finding the time during the week to be in the Word of God? Equipped with the right tools, we can learn to listen to God.... What are these tools?

A regular time and place. Select a slot on your schedule and a corner of your world, and claim it for God. For some it may be best to do this in the morning. Others prefer the evening and others prefer many encounters during the day. Some sit under a tree. Others in the kitchen. Maybe your commute to work, or your lunch break would be the appropriate time for you. The important thing is for you to find a time and a place that seems right for you.

How much time should you take? As much as you need. Value quality over length. Your time with God should last long enough for you to say what you want and for God to say what he wants. Which leads us to a second tool you need - - an open Bible.

God speaks to us through his Word. The first step in reading the Bible is to ask God to help you understand it. Before reading the Bible, pray. Don't go to Scripture looking for you own idea; go searching for God's. Read the Bible prayerfully. Also, read the Bible carefully.

Here is a practical point. *Study the Bible a little at a time*. God seems to send messages as he did his manna: one day's portion at a t time. Choose depth over quantity. Read until a verse "hits" you, then stop and meditate on it. Copy the verse onto a sheet of paper, write it in your journal, and reflect on it several times.

Will I learn what God intends? If I listen, I will.

Understanding comes a little at a time..... over a lifetime.

#### Intern Pastor's Report – Kevin Hall

June involved quite a bit of "orientation" type things as I learned about Prince of Peace and about my role as a shepherd. Pastor Sperry and Pastor Tom have both been patient and knowledgeable instructors.

I preached 3 times in June (once at Golden Valley, twice at Prince of Peace) and made 10 visitations, as well as helped with VBS. In July I will be preaching on the 21<sup>st</sup> at Prince of Peace.

On Saturday the 27<sup>th</sup> of July, which is the Saturday after the week of family camp, I hope to take a trip to Webster South Dakota for the Georg Sverdrup Summer meeting. Three papers will be presented at the meeting 1.) "Sverdrup's understanding of the Free and Living Congregation," by Rev. Martin Horn 2.) "The Congregation as the Bride of Christ" by Rev. Alex Amiot and 3.) Rev. Raynard Huglen, "The Free Church Congregation in Practice." These are three big topics in the life of the Church, and three men I have great respect for presenting them, so I'm excited to hear them.

I want invite as many Council members as might be even remotely interested to come with because Sverdrup's vision of the congregation is both awesome and infectious. I also have another continuing ed. event coming up in August. Summer Institute of Theology will be held on campus back at Plymouth.

#### <u> Deacon's Report – Kevin Lee</u>

Spiritual life meetings: So far, our possibilities have not come to pass. Pastor Kent has another contact to make. Kevin Lee mentioned that Michael Rokenbrodt gave a dramatic portrayal at the Annual Conference, but we are not sure that this would fit with our Spiritual Life Meetings.

Men's study: Pastor Kent and Kevin Hall will choose something that they can co-lead.

Library: Standards for the books chosen - Riley had sent out a good draft for a general library policy. We discussed a few changes. Pastor Kent will try to incorporate the changes and additions into a final draft. Then the Deacons will address it with the librarians and get their input.

We discussed the ad in the Beacon for the Pregnancy crisis center (First Choice Clinic/Women's Care Center) in Bismarck. We are paying approximately \$116 per month for it. We voted to cancel the ad in the Beulah Beacon and donate \$100 a month directly to the crisis center. The Deacons will look into placing an ad in the Beulah High School paper.

#### Trustee's Report – Randy Schneider

Randy checked and we can't do the lighting project ourselves – we need an electrician to do the actual connecting of the lights. An electrician would charge \$55 per light if we used the old lights – that would include the electrician labor and the kit. The Trustees have talked to members about helping and everyone prefers to help after summer.

Haven't received any prices for the concrete work we'd like to do.

#### <u>Christian Ed Report – Michelle Klaudt</u> Sunday School:

Discussion regarding making a cd or Spotify account for Sunday School music this upcoming year.

Donna suggested incorporating the following items into Sunday School

- Memory Work (i.e. Ten Commandments, verses every week) and having quarterly prizes for the kids who participate.
- A reenactment of a bible story by the Sunday School for the congregation
- Making Sunday School longer, possibly from 10:30 11:45
- Having a Sunday School offering goal and if the kids accomplish the goal, we would have an ice cream party.

Youth Committee:

- There will be a youth event at Riverside park on June 19.
- There will be Paintball on June 29<sup>.</sup>
- FLY is June 30 July 6 and we have 11-12 kids are signed up.

#### Old Business:

-VBS (any changes for next year)

- Order Lanyards with Name Badges again Next year.
- Look into ordering older and younger kids' crafts.
- Call Killdeer and ask if they need any crafts

#### New Business:

-Christmas VBS:

- We are considering holding a Christmas day long VBS on December 14 or 21.
- Angie will work on a schedule for the day
- Sign-up will be held through Survey Monkey and will be open to the first 100 kids.
- Sign-up Genius will be used for the helpers as we hope to have this as a community wide event where each Church will help.

#### OLD BUSINESS

Van for Church – We discussed cost, mileage, how many times a year would we use it and storing it inside. Discussed renting a van verses purchasing one and what would be best. We will do more research and discuss again at our next council meeting. We will need congregational approval before purchasing.

#### <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

**Tithe** - We voted to split our tithe: \$2252.18 to AFLC Seminary and \$300 to Lacey Wenning for her mission trip.
