"Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy." (Exodus 20:8 ESV)

As summer comes to an end, I'm reminded of the Third Commandment, given by God to his people. I'm reminded of this command as I anticipate all of our activities resuming full speed, and the many opportunities we'll have to engage with the Word of God. And I pray that all of us will make use of as many of these opportunities as possible.

When we think of this Commandment, we normally think of Sunday morning. We think this way because, as we read the remainder of this command, God reminds us that he created the earth in six days and rested on the seventh. In the same way, he says, his people are to work six days, keeping the seventh day holy.

Sunday morning is certainly a part of this. Each Sunday, we have the opportunity to gather

together for corporate worship, and to hear the Word of God as it's read and proclaimed. However, in reality, this command involves so much more. In his Small Catechism, Martin Luther explains it in this way: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise his Word and the preaching of the same, but regard it holy and gladly hear and learn it."

Now that Christ has fulfilled the Law, no longer are we obligated to adhere to a system of days, months, seasons, and years (Galatians 4:8-11). This Commandment, rather, obligates us to attend to the Word of God. And as a people who have been redeemed and filled with the Spirit of God, it's more than an obligation. It's a longing and a joy.

While we can't be at church every moment (we do have other responsibilities and vocations after all), I do encourage you to take part in every opportunity you can to be in the Word of God. Realizing that I'll forget some of the opportunities available, there are plenty for both adults and children alike.

Sunday School will begin for all ages on September 8th. And while we do have a good number of children who stay for Sunday School each week, the same cannot be said of our adults. Please take advantage of this opportunity!

In addition to this, adult Bible study will be starting on September 4th at 7:00, where we'll begin our year looking at the book of Galatians and the reason God accepts us. Our men's breakfast and study will begin September 21st, where our intern, Kevin Hall, will lead the men in a practical look at the Augsburg Confession, preparing us to serve at home as well as in the church. Spiritual Life Meetings are being planned for the first week of November. And while I don't know the particulars of the studies, the WMF hosts studies each month, and numerous small groups will begin to meet.

Our youth will also begin confirmation instruction. Middle School Bible Study and the High School Youth Group will resume. And, of course, special opportunities will be available to the youth throughout the year.

Again, recognizing the importance of God's Word, I encourage you to make use of every opportunity possible. May we not despise God's Word, relegating it to a place of secondary importance in our life. Let us, rather, deem it holy and gladly hear what God has spoken to us.

Well, what about all those other footprints?

1 Corinthians 1:2-3 (ESV) ² To the [congregation] of God that is in Corinth, to those sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints together with all those who in every place call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours: ³ Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

In one of our bathrooms here at Prince of Peace we have a plaque that references the widely known but fictional account of Jesus and the footprints in the sand. In this story, the man compares walking through life with Jesus to walking alongside a seashore. When the man looks back, he notices only one set of footprints and asks Jesus why that is. Jesus responds with (as our plaque says), "Where there's only one set of footprints, that is where I carried you."

That story is a pretty good depiction of our personal relationships with Jesus. Part of our faith-walk is understanding our individual need to be carried by Jesus. But another part of our faith-walk is seeing a great mass of other footprints in front of, behind, and all alongside us, so that we can notice everybody else that Jesus is carrying too.

As Paul explains in Verse 2 of our passage here, that's really what the Christian Church is. It's first and foremost an assembly or congregation of people who have been forgiven, justified and made alive in Christ (in Verse 2, Paul combined all those ideas under the idea of "sanctified"). That's really what the Church is, it's the collective body of saints, saints being anyone and everyone who has been saved by the grace of Jesus Christ.

The Reformation was a huge shift in how we think about both the "one" set of footprints and the "great mass" of footprints. The Word of God used Luther and the other reformers proclaim the formerly obscured truths about how God saves individual

sinners and also how He gathers them together to work in His Kingdom.

The parts of the Reformation dealing with individuals have spread around the world like wildfire. "Salvation by Grace through Faith" is a phrase well known by now, and is illustrated pretty well by the single footprint thing. The Reformation was a strong repudiation of the idea that we could carry ourselves to heaven.

The parts of the Reformation dealing with how we define and think about the Church, however, have been much less successful as spreading. This is a funny thing because without the rediscovery of the Bible's teaching about what the Church is, no one would have ever listened to Luther explain what the Bible says about individual salvation.

Very early in Christian history (105 ADish), a Bishop named Ignatius explained his idea of what the church was this way; "Where the Bishop/Pastor appears, there the mass of people must be... It is not lawful either to baptize or to hold communion without the bishop." This was interpreted to mean that the Church is not made up of a bunch of people being carried by Jesus, but a bunch of people being carried by Jesus *if and only if the Bishop approved it.*

Eventually the Roman Catholic bishops installed a bishop over all the other bishops, and so what he said become even more powerful than the Word of God. To them, the church was only the church if the Pope said so. Jesus had little to say about the matter. So, for a very long time it was taught that the Church was not the people of God walking with Jesus, but rather the Pope and his appointed bishops. The church was somehow something separate from the congregation believers. The Pope spoke for the entire body of Christ, and so if the Pope said Luther was wrong about salvation by grace, who could argue with him? The Pope was the true Church and Luther was just some guy who had spent way too much time reading the Bible.

Of course, none of that quote from Ignatius or what the Romanists taught comes even close to squaring with what Paul's concept of the Christian Church. As Paul shows us here in 1 Cor. 1:2, the Biblical teaching is that the Congregation/Church of God is the assembly of the People of God. It is those who are sanctified by Jesus Christ. It is those, who like Luther was, have been made alive by the Word of God. It's everyone walking in the sand with Jesus. The Word is powerful and certainly does not need the permission of a Bishop to do its work. Bishops can't tell Jesus who He will and will not carry. This is why Luther's excommunication of the Pope was more valid than Pope's excommunication of Luther.

As central as this idea is to our understanding of the Church and salvation and our walk with Christ, it doesn't seem to be widely held or understood by American Protestantism. We understand that people are brought to life by grace through faith, but to say that a Congregation is brought to life by grace through faith is a bit of a foreign thought to us. But again, as 1 Corinthians 1:2 shows us, it is Jesus and Him alone who calls our Congregation to life and no one else.

So with the widespread confusion about what the Church is, it's not surprising that there is also widespread confusion about what the Church should do. To carry on with the metaphor- whereas a functional Church might look like Jesus carrying a whole bunch of people along the beach, many churches are either standing on their own feet and arguing about where to carry Jesus, or they are standing around waiting for a Bishop to tell them where they should walk. We need to be an entire group of people being carried by Jesus.

So what does that look like? How do we do that? These are huge and important questions, much to big to answer here, so Pastor Kent and I will be addressing in our Fall sermon series: "Why do we need the Church?" It's my prayer that in this series we will learn more about how Jesus carries us, and even how He calls us to carry each other, in His body of saints, our Congregation.

Don't take this metaphor to far, it'll become heretical. But not taken too far, it works. Because it's the Bible that gives us all the power to actually accomplish stuff. The Bible's the gun. The Augsburg Confession just helps us a bit to see what the Bible is likely to accomplish when we use it. The A.C.'s the scope.

So come to our men's study. Bring your Bible. And let's all get equipped.

A polite reminder - those who use the kitchen are responsible for washing the dishcloths and towels and returning them to the drawers! (this includes fellowship!)

I missed so many of the WMF Bible studies. Guess I was out of town more than usual and I got mixed up on the month we usually skip Bible study during the summer. I didn't even realize that this year's study has twelve lessons. Ordinarily there are only eleven lessons. I did enjoy going through the lessons myself.

Lesson 5 was "HANNAH...A Godly Mother."
"Hannah is one of the exemplary Bible women from whom we can learn many lessons. Not only mothers-but all women-can be inspired by Hannah to commit their 'hopes and longings' to our Lord Jesus Christ in spite of life's setbacks and sorrows." This is the opening to the lesson. Hannah was the barren wife of Elkanah. She wanted a child desperately. She wept much and prayed to the LORD Almighty and promised that if He gave her a son, she would dedicate him to serve the Lord at the temple. She got a son, Samuel, and took him to the temple as she promised. She also had three more boys and two girls. God is faithful. Can we be faithful to Him?

Lesson 6 "ADAM AND EVE: The Problem of Temptation" This was an odd lesson in this study of "God's servants teaching us life lessons", it seemed to me. But as I looked at it again, I saw how Adam and Eve were tempted and succumbed to the temptation. We all live under this curse now but God didn't leave us there. He had a plan from the beginning. He would send us His Son. Jesus

would become the perfect, sinless sacrifice necessary to redeem us from death. He would be tempted by Satan as Satan had tempted Eve; appealing to the lust of the flesh, the lust of our eyes and the pride of life. But Jesus would not sin. He used God's word to resist the devil saying: "It is written: 'Man does not live on bread alone.', "It is written: 'Worship the Lord your God and serve Him only.' "It says: Do not put the Lord your God to the test." This is a lesson for us to use as we are tempted. We must have the Word of God hidden in our hearts. We must love Jesus more than our own life. We must submit to God and resist the devil and the devil will flee. This was a very good lesson for a servant of God.

Lessons 7 & 8 are about "JOSEPH...God working out His Perfect Plan". We looked at various portions in Genesis, chapters 37-50. Joseph came from a dysfunctional family. He was really put to the test. But the "Lord was with Joseph, and he prospered..." "Lord was with him: He showed Joseph kindness and granted him favor..." Genesis 39:2, 21. Of all the bad things that happened to Joseph, Joseph said..."but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives." Genesis 50:20. Joseph has some Christ like qualities: He trusted in God; he was truly humble; always gave God the credit; he had to suffer before he rose; and he forgave those who hurt him. How do we compare?

We will look at Lesson 9: "NEHEMIAH...Build a Strong Wall of Christlike Living." on Monday, September 16, at 10:30 and 6:30 in the church library. Please come join us.




<u> Sunday School Corner</u>

Being a Witness

I wanted to share something with Y'all today. It's one of my favorite C.S. Lewis devotionals on being a witness, by Inspiration Ministries

It was a walk that would have far-reaching impact. It took place on this day in 1931 as three Oxford University professors decided to stroll down Addison's Walk, near Magdalen College. Two were committed Christians: J.R.R. Tolkien (who gained fame as the author of the *Hobbit* and *The Lord of the Rings*) and Huge Dyson. The third was C.S. Lewis. Lewis had interest in Christianity but continued to have reservations. In particular, he didn't understand the sacrifice of Jesus. Tolkien and Dyson asked Lewis to think about the many examples in world literature of heroes who sacrificed themselves for a cause. The difference was that the story of Jesus "was true." It "really happened."

Their arguments made sense to Lewis. That night, he realized that his questions had been answered, and became a Christian without reservation. Lewis went on to influence thousands for Christ through books, articles, and talks. The turning point was that long walk.


Every believer has the joy and responsibility of telling others about their faith. When we do, we follow the example of Andrew. Among the first to follow Jesus, he was eager to tell others the Good News, starting with his brother Peter. As a result of his witness, he helped change the world!

Jesus told His disciples, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses" (Acts 1:8). Now, we are His witnesses.

In your life, look for an opportunity to witness through your actions and words. You witness when you listen to others and answer their questions. When you tell them what Jesus has done for you.

It's important for us as Christ Followers to witness to others, and it's just as important for us to know why God calls us to witness to others!

Pastor's Report - Pastor Kent

I've continued to attend meetings with hospice every other week to discuss the care and the care plans of the patients.

Attended our AFLC district family camp from July 21st-25th. I was elected co-dean of the camp. So, with Seth (who is the camp secretary) we'll have a heavy role in planning camp for 2020.

I will be attending World Missions meetings and the AFLC pastor's conference between September 15th-19th.

Intern Pastor's Report - Kevin Hall

I made a few rounds at the nursing homes and the assisted living centers and have now become a bit more familiar with them.

I was able to assist Pastor Olson with Bea Neuberger's visitation and funeral. I attended Darold Benz's funeral, as his grandson Justin and I were roommates in college. The mother of my High School best friend passed away after a long battle with cancer. I have to be honest, going home and watching my home Pastor officiate the funeral while in the midst of his own intense grief at the loss of his longtime friend impressed upon me the weight of ministry in a new way. Funerals are always hard, and yet they are always an awesome opportunity to share the good news and the wonderful hope that we have in Christ, and with hurting people who need that hope the most. With this in mind, I'm newly excited at the opportunity to be the one sharing that Gospel message, but also more keenly aware of the considerable emotional burden that that ministry carries.

I count 14 visits, though I also realize now that I need to do a better job keeping track. I hope this is

an area of ministry that can grow for me, but also realize that I need to get faster at writing sermons and lessons for that to happen.

Pastor Sperry has asked me to write the men's study and I am excited at the opportunity. I intend to go through the Augsburg Confession and show its biblical grounding, which I admit sounds boring on paper, but my prayer is that I can succeed at making it both fun and useful.

I did make the trip to Webster, SD where a very small number of Sverdrup die-hards met and celebrated our Free Lutheran Heritage. It was fascinating and humbling listening to Rev. Raynard Huglen speak of his experience and all the work he did on behalf of the AFLC in the early years of our association. I also really enjoyed listening to Rev. Alex Amiot and Rev. Martin Horn discuss the holiness of the Christian congregation, and the local congregation as the Bride of Christ.

I feel like I have grown as a minister of the Word these last few months, but I am also keenly aware of areas where I can improve or continue to grow. It's interesting as you start out in ministry and become aware for the first time of strengths and giftings you didn't realize you had, as well as weaknesses and growth areas that you never would have anticipated. I'm thankful all the more that my sufficiency is found in Christ, and that He will build His congregation, despite my weaknesses and inadequacies.

Christian Ed Report – Michelle Klaudt

Christmas Bible school was discussed for December 14th. We will continue to discuss the event and come to final decision at next meeting. Concerns were raised about staffing and timing with the church Christmas program. If it is decided to, we may need to add it to the budget for the upcoming year. Look at dividing the volunteer load into shifts.

Watched webinar about AFLC Curriculum. Discussed the idea of switching to it instead of ABC in Genesis in the fall for younger ages. It was decided to switch Preschool to Grade 8th for the upcoming school year. Donna will order materials by Friday, July 26th. Pastor Kent and

Seth will be contacted to discuss the change and what materials they will use for the upcoming year.

OLD BUSINESS

Church Van – We discussed if it would be more feasible to rent a van when needed. Don Buck has contact car rental agencies in Bismarck and Dickinson on none of them have a 15-passenger van available to rent. The closest 15-passenger van to rent is in Fargo. We discussed if a regular mini-van would serve our purposes, but they usually only seat 7 people, so may not fit our needs. Seth will email a list of events that he can use a church van for and list how many kids he took on this past year's events.

Security Camera by east Door – In May we passed a motion for the Trustees to hire someone or for them to install a security camera. No update on this.

NEW BUSINESS

Sanctuary Carpet – We have a bid to professionally clean the carpets in church from Service Plus. Total for all 3 services = \$3781.65 for a total of 7,415 square feet. We tabled this until next month for more information.

Roomba Vacuum for Sanctuary – We voted to purchase a Roomba 980 vacuum and virtual walls to use under the sanctuary chairs. It can be running while janitors do other cleaning. Total cost for everything will be under \$1,000.

Tithe - We voted to split our tithe: \$1927.08 to AFLBS and \$300 to Lacey Wenning for her mission trip.
