"But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come

also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. But each in his own order: Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power."

(1Corinthians 15:20-24 ESV)

Easter is upon us. And regardless of whether we can join together in public celebration of Jesus' resurrection, this remains true. He has risen from the grave, and this is of utmost importance for each of us.

The resurrection of Jesus assures us of the truth of the gospel. Because he's risen from the grave, we know that the penalty of our sin has been paid. Because he's risen from the grave, we know that the power of death has been defeated. And, because he's risen from the grave, we know that we too will, one day, rise.

Christ is the firstfruits, Paul tells us. He is the first to rise from the grave. And, as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive.

When Jesus returns, Scripture tells us, the dead will be raised. Then comes the end. Then comes the end when we'll dwell eternally with Christ in the new creation prepared for us.

This is our hope! And what a great hope it is. It in no way compares to our life in this world.

Many of us struggle as we near the end of our time in this life. Many of us struggle with the idea of death. Many of us struggle with the idea of the

end of the world. We want to hang on to this life. We want to hang on to that which is so familiar.

But what we are to receive is so much greater. What we are to receive far surpasses the fallen world in which we now find ourselves. In fact, it's beyond our comprehension.

Realizing this, letting go of what we now have is that much easier. Reaching out for that which is to come is that much easier. We can do so knowing that Christ has redeemed us and saved us from this world of sin and death.

I'm not suggesting that we squander the life God has given to us right here and right now. I'm not suggesting that we throw it away. And I'm not suggesting that it's of no value.

However, this life isn't our goal. Jesus didn't suffer and die, nor did he rise, that we might remain in this fallen world. He endured the cross that we might receive something far greater.

UPDATE

As a congregation, there are many things currently on our radar. The first big event coming up is Easter. The following week, our spring Spiritual Life meetings are scheduled to be held. Confirmation is scheduled for the first Sunday in May. And, of course, graduations fall right after.

I have been in regular communication with medical staff from the area, belonging to our church, for advice regarding how to proceed. At this point, it looks like we'll continue with electronic/video-based ministry through April.

This means that Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter services will be online. It means that we'll be working to reschedule our speaker for Spiritual Life Meetings until fall. And we will likely have a video-based replacement for these meetings, the week of April 19th. If anything should suddenly change, and the church is able to reopen, we'll let you know right away.

Looking beyond April, we are keeping these events on the calendar for the time being. We are preparing for confirmation as if it will happen. And we are planning for graduation recognition as if it will happen. However, please bear in mind that we must be flexible. If things don't begin to improve, some of these additional events will be postponed or canceled altogether.

As I've said several times already, please take advantage of everything we are offering, from devotionals, video/audio recorded services, online Bible studies, etc. We are trying to minister in every way we can during this time.

Please, also, continue to give as you always have. You can mail in your offerings, or you can give electronically on our new Faithlife app as well as on our website. We ask you to do so that our ministry might continue without any problems.

We look forward to gathering again. The first Sunday we resume public worship will be a communion Sunday, regardless of where it falls in the month. And please let us know if we can do anything for you in the meantime.

This is no time to stop worshiping together. Hebrews 10:22-25 (ESV) 19 Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, 20 by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh, 21 and since we have a great priest over the house of God, 22 let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. 23 Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. 24 And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, 25 not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near.

Verse 25 has been heavy on my heart the last few weeks. Our physical separation is a necessity, so if "not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some," means we must on a regular basis come together and breathe the same oxygen, then we're just plain stuck between a rock and a hard place. If verse 25 is a formal, religious requirement (as if the text means "you must worship together once a week or you are not Christian"), we're simply not going to be able to fulfill it, and we're in trouble. Thankfully this isn't the case. Sure, we do need to practice our religion, but woe to us if we do it at the expense of "the weightier matters of the Law," (See Matthew 23:23).

Praise the Lord then that this portion of scripture is not intended to pile onto us more religious duties. The author is exhorting us to walk with ever greater confidence in the promises (v.23) and finished work (v.19-20) of Jesus Christ. Since (v.19) we have these awesome things, therefore let us (v.22) continue to draw ever closer to Christ. The purpose of our gathering for worship is not to earn the grace of God by fulfilling religious duties, rather it is a response to the grace of God, and it's where we receive the grace of God. This is important for us to remember as we have had to change how we worship. Why are we crowding around laptops in our pajamas? Since we can't "go" to church, can't we just skip it?

No, brothers and sisters. It is more important now than ever that we worship together, in Spirit, and that we worship Jesus in His Word. If we are all to crowd around our devices and watch ourselves on YouTube, then that is what we must do. And since God has given us more time to study Scripture, then that is what we must do, especially right now.

A few verses later he writes,

Hebrews 10:32-36 (ESV) 32 But recall the former days when, after you were enlightened, you endured a hard struggle with sufferings, 33 sometimes being publicly exposed to reproach and affliction, and sometimes being partners with those so treated. 34 For you had compassion on those in prison, and you joyfully accepted the plundering of your property, since you knew that you yourselves had a better possession and an abiding one. 35 Therefore do not throw away your confidence, which has a great reward. 36 For you have need of endurance, so that when you have done the will of God you may receive what is promised.

The original audience of the book of Hebrews was dealing with affliction. They were struggling with some stuff, and their responses to their struggles were varied. Some of them were bailing on the whole Christianity thing entirely. For them, life was just easier without it.

Other Christians were being grown by the Word of God in the midst of their struggles. Their bold adherence to their confession that Jesus Christ is the Lord of all mankind was making them mighty. They were able to endure public humiliation (v.33), theft, property and income loss and even imprisonment (v.34) and other hard struggles (v.32). Through all this they kept their confidence (V.34), but as one might expect, the whole ordeal required a whole bunch of endurance that came from outside of them (V.35).

I guess what I'm saying is, I don't think it's so far-fetched to think that for a short time we will also need that endurance and confidence. We too may deal with income loss, hardship, a strange kind of imprisonment and maybe even some kinds of humiliation. I pray we don't have to, but it sure seems possible. We too will need that endurance that comes from Christ.

Our endurance comes from Christ. It's a spiritual gift given to us by Jesus Christ (Philippians 4:13), but it's

given, we don't earn it, create it, or find it deep within us. We receive it the same way we receive anything and everything we receive from Jesus Christ, including His Holy Spirit, which is through the Gospel (Romans 1:16, Galatians 3:3-6.) Paul says in Romans 5:1-5 that when you place your faith in the grace of Christ, your suffering actually creates endurance. Growing in your knowledge of the grace of God will actually enable you to rejoice in the midst of suffering, rather than be pulled away from God by suffering.

On the other hand, though, when we endure adversity and suffering by ourselves, instead of relying on the promises of God, we will probably fall away. That's why the writer to the Hebrews was warning his people that they must grow in their faith during their struggle, because his audience was being enticed away from the one true faith by the false promise and "easier" options. He saw that some of his people were not growing in grace, but instead they were falling away, and the consequences were dire. He wrote,

Hebrews 10:26-31 (ESV) 26 For if we go on sinning deliberately after receiving the knowledge of the truth, there no longer remains a sacrifice for sins, 27 but a fearful expectation of judgment, and a fury of fire that will consume the adversaries. 28 Anyone who has set aside the law of Moses dies without mercy on the evidence of two or three witnesses. 29 How much worse punishment, do you think, will be deserved by the one who has trampled underfoot the Son of God, and has profaned the blood of the covenant by which he was sanctified, and has outraged the Spirit of grace? 30 For we know him who said, "Vengeance is mine; I will repay." And again, "The Lord will judge his people." 31 It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

It's not by accident that Hebrews puts these tough words in between discussions of why we worship together and how we endure trials. It is literally hearing the Word of God that has rescued us from judgement and brought us into life (John 5:24). If hearing the Word can do that, surely reading the Word can help us endure our earthly struggles, and even do so to the glory of our God and the advancement of His Kingdom.

As Paul says in Romans 15:4-7 (ESV) 4 For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement

of the Scriptures we might have hope. 5 May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live in such harmony with one another, in accord with Christ Jesus, 6 that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

So right now, we cannot physically come together (though we will again soon), but we must continue to worship together. This time is actually a unique and wonderful opportunity. How many Christians think to themselves "I wish I had more time to read the Bible," but never experience any kind of disruption in their life to actually find the time. Well, the opportunity has come, and the time is now. Not only do we have the opportunity to slow down and spend more time in Scripture, we must slow down and spend more time exploring the promises and works of our great and loving God. For now, even though we do not gather physically, we must continue to gather together under Christ's Word.

The Lord is thy shade upon thy right hand. 6. The sun shall not smite thee by day, nor the moon by night. 7. The Lord shall preserve thee from all evil: he shall preserve thy soul. 8. The Lord shall preserve thy going out and thy coming in from this time forth, and even for evermore.

Prince of Peace Women's Missionary Federation (WMF)

The Mission of the WMF of Prince of Peace is to study and share the Good News of Jesus, through word and deed, at home, in our community and throughout the world.

When will ever get to be together again? Missing the fellowship and camaraderie of the church family. Joan and I were thinking along the same line and we both looked at some of our WMF Bible study lessons.

I was looking at my WMF Bible study book at Lesson 3, "When I Feel Hopeless". I have sort of been feeling that way lately. The lesson starts "Are you discouraged, defeated? Do you feel like giving up? Have you struggled with feeling worthless and rejected? Perhaps someone close to you feels that way. ...Where do you go to find hope?"

Author Linda Korhonen said in bold caps: "CONCENTRATE ON THE TRUTHS ABOUT GOD"; "OUR VALUE COMES FROM GOD HIMSELF!"; "REJECT SATAN'S LIES"; "We demolish lies with TRUTH!" God's Word is TRUTH. We cannot rely on our feelings about ourselves because our sinful flesh will always disappoint us. The author uses a train to illustrate this: the engine is FACT that pulls us to FAITH and while our FEELINGS are important they can't be allowed to pull the train when we get down.

Some words of promise from God's word in Lesson 3: Romans 15:13 "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." and Psalm 62:5-6 "Find rest, o my soul, in God alone: My hope comes from Him. He alone is my rock and my salvation; He is my fortress; I will not be shaken."

I also looked at Lesson 4, our April lesson,

"The Poison of Unresolved Anger". I thought I don't identify with anger. As the day went on I was feeling trapped in my own home away from those people I love and need: my Grands, my kids, my friends, my church family, and this could go on for so much longer. I got mad! I got mad at my fellow prisoner, and everyone who is making these "rules". I guess this lesson is for me.

Joan looked at Lesson 5, our May lesson. She sent out sweet note to many of our dear ladies who attend these studies. Some of you may have read the e-mail and this is sort of a summary of that note.

She had been working ahead on her WMF Bible study and was on Lesson 5. Very timely for what is happening now: "Why Do I Experience Suffering". The Lessons have "little boxes" with food for thought. On page 36 a box says "DON'T ASK 'WHY?' BUT RATHER ASK WHAT DOES GOD WANT TO TEACH ME THROUGH THIS?" James 1:2-4 is probably familiar to most of you; "Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance. Perseverance must finish it's work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything."

We may have to admit that we are having trouble considering what is happening with ""pure joy" but we must try to see the benefits of what is happening. It does bring joy to see how positive so many people are being. The sunshine and warmth God sends when we need it is such a blessing to us. If you have time, take a look at Lesson 5.

Many of you are working from home, have children perhaps that are being home schooled and have to maybe cook a bit more and there are all the regular chores that need to be done. That can be exhausting. Joan and I will be praying for you. Looking ahead to when we can gather again!
