Pastor Kent "...you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." (Matthew 1:21 ESV)

Although Christmas is a Christian holiday, it's truly a worldwide celebration. It's a holiday that's enjoyed by Christians and non-Christians alike. It's even a holiday that's celebrated and enjoyed by people of other faiths.

Even knowing that Christmas is the celebration of Jesus' birth, it's clear that, for many of us, the true meaning of the holiday has been lost. It's clear that we don't understand the significance of his birth. And it's clear that we don't understand the reason for this holy day.

This is true, even knowing that Jesus is our Savior. It's true even knowing that he is our Deliverer. It's true even knowing that he's our Redeemer.

We recognize the correct terms. And we use the correct terms. But we do so without fully grasping their meaning.

As I've said a couple of times recently, if Jesus came to save us, there is clearly something from which we need to be saved. And it's this that we fail to grasp. We do not recognize our bondage, nor do we want to.

As the angel told Joseph in the above passage, the child to be born was to be named Jesus, which means "The Lord is Salvation." This was to be his name because of what he was to do. He would save his people from their sins.

It's this that we fail to believe about ourselves. It's this that we fail to acknowledge about ourselves. And if we do, our tendency is to soften it.

We don't want to acknowledge the fact that we are sinners. We might acknowledge the fact that we are imperfect. And we might acknowledge the fact that we make mistakes. But we struggle to believe or to acknowledge that we are sinners.

We also don't want to believe or acknowledge that we're deserving of the consequences of sin. We don't want to believe or acknowledge that we're deserving of death. And we certainly don't want to believe or acknowledge that we're deserving of hell.

But this, you see, is exactly why Jesus was born into the world. He was born to save us from sin. He came to deliver us from death and hell.

He did this, of course, by his death on the cross. He did this by offering himself as the atoning sacrifice for our sins. He did this by taking upon himself the penalty that we've incurred.

This is the reason why we celebrate his birth. He came to do for us what we're unable to do for ourselves. And, in this way, as we trust in him, we are granted the blessings of forgiveness and life everlasting.





As many of you know, I was blessed with a chance to visit Israel recently along with a few of my fellow seminarians. Because of this, I thought it would be a good idea to use my remaining newsletter portions to share a photo or two from the trip and talk about ideas from Scripture that came to my mind.

Following the order of our trip, the first place to show off is the city of Jerusalem. During our first few days on the ground, we explored the old city as well as the nearby important sites, such as the garden tomb and the Mount of Olives.

The picture above is taken from the Mount of Olives. Heading down the mountain and across the valley, you can see along the right side of the wall a high spot where a gate was once open. This gate is known as the Golden



The Golden Gate was filled in with stones in years past, but because of how it opened right into the area near the temple, it is very likely that this is the gate that Christ used in His Triumphal Entry on Palm Sunday. I share this because two ideas sprang into my mind when reflecting upon this gate and the entrance to Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives. Both of these ideas are connected to the season of Advent. In Advent, we are called to prepare our hearts for the coming Savior. Advent is a time of hopeful anticipation. The Prophet Isaiah spoke of this preparation, which was called for by John the Baptist in the time of Christ.

Isaiah 40:1–5 (ESV) — 1 Comfort, comfort my people, says your God. 2 Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that her warfare is ended, that her iniquity is pardoned, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins. 3 A voice cries: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. 4 Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. 5 And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

The first photo shows off both hills and a valley. But in preparation for Christ, the lows are to be made high and the highs are to be made low. In Advent, this call goes forth to us. Where we are proud and boastful, we are called to humble ourselves in light of the coming King. Where we have been broken and crushed into lows, we are given a hope in the Savior King that raises us up from our despair. The glory of the King levels the playing field and shows the great need every one of us, from highest to lowest, has for the Savior who is to come. The Golden Gate also makes me think of the wonderful Advent hymn "Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates." In our Ambassador Hymnal, this is the first hymn, making the beginning of the year in the Church calendar that calls us to look ahead to the birth of Christ. As you read through this hymn (or even sing it), may these photos and verses come into your mind as you consider the Savior who has come.

Think of how He calls us to repent of our pride. Think of how He comforts us, as Isaiah said, by telling us that our iniquity, our sins, are pardoned. Only the forgiveness of Christ can lift us up from our lows and give us a foundation firmer than the gates and walls of Jerusalem. May the Savior King lift you up this day and fill you with hope in His saving work for you!

"Lift up your heads, ye mighty gates; Behold, the King of glory waits; The King of kings is drawing near; The Savior of the world is here!

O blest the land, the city blest, Where Christ the ruler is confessed! O happy hearts and happy homes To whom this king in triumph comes!

Fling wide the portals of your heart; Make it a temple, set apart From earthly use for heaven's employ, Adorned with prayer and love and joy.

Redeemer, come, with us abide; Our hearts to Thee we open wide; Let us Thy inner presence feel; Thy grace and love in us reveal."
