"Rise up; come to our help! Redeem us for the sake of your steadfast love!" Psalm 44:26 ESV

Many times, as believers, we are disappointed in God. We feel let down by him. And we feel that we've been rejected by him.

Throughout the course of our lives, we've heard how God has acted on behalf of his people. We've learned in Sunday School how God saved his people from slavery in Egypt, bringing them into the Promised Land. We've learned through sermons how God has acted in miraculous ways for the sake of his people. We've learned in Bible studies how God has intervened in situations that seemed hopeless. And we've learned through our own personal Bible reading how, in Jesus, God has both provided and promised his blessing. This, then, has led us to trust in him. It's led us to offer to him our prayers. And it's led us to depend upon him.

However, as we go through life, God often seems absent. As we offer our prayers and requests, he remains silent. And as we experience trials and tribulations, he offers no relief.

What are we to do in times like this? What are we to do when God seems absent? What are we to do when he seems silent? And what are we to do when he seems to offer no help?

Looking at Psalm 44, a similar set of circumstances are described for us. The author expresses, first of all, how the people had heard from their fathers the deeds the Lord had performed in the days of old. And he expresses his faith in the Lord, who acted in these ways.

But then, in verse 9, his tone changes. In fact, it sounds accusatory. He seems to suggest that, although the people had not forgotten him, God had rejected and disgraced them. Although their heart had not turned back nor had they ceased to walk in his ways, he'd caused them to be taunted and reviled.

He, then, calls upon God to awake. He asks why God is hiding his face from them. And he expresses the state of humiliation in which they found themselves.

As we read these words, I'm sure that we can relate to his feelings. We can relate to his circumstances. And we can relate to his complaint.

But, at the end of this Psalm, in the verse seen above, we find that he does not lose hope. We find that he does not turn from the Lord. He, instead, cries out to him once again.

And this, you see, is what we must do when we feel that God has let us down. This is what we must do when we feel that he's turned is back on us. We must cry out to him once again, trusting in his steadfast love.

As the apostle Paul reminds us in Romans 8:32, "He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?"

The Inspired Word

You must remain faithful to the things you have been taught.... You have been taught the holy Scriptures from childhood, and they have given you the wisdom to receive the salvation that comes by trusting in Christ Jesus. 2 Timothy 3:14-15

Can we believe that "all Scripture is inspired by God" (2 Timothy 3:16)? Here is why I think we can.

It is remarkable in composition. Composed over sixteen centuries by forty authors. Begun by Moses in Arabia and finished by John on Patmos. Penned by kings in palaces, shepherds in tents, and prisoners in prisons. Would it be possible for forty writers, writing in three different languages and several different countries, separated by as much as sixteen hundred years, to produce a book of singular theme unless behind them there was one mind and one designer?

It is remarkable in durability. It is the single most published book in history. Translated into at least twelve hundred languages. Bibles have been burned by governments and banished from courtrooms, but God's Word endures. The death knell has been sounded a hundred times, but God's Word continues.

It is remarkable in prophecy. More than three hundred fulfilled prophecies about the life of Christ, were all written at least four hundred years before he was born, Imagine if something similar occurred today. If we found a book written in 1900 that prophesied two world wars, a depression, an atomic bomb, and the assassinations of a president and a civil rights leader, wouldn't we trust it???

Deacon's Report – Kevin Lee Spiritual Life Meetings –We gave feedback on the recent meetings. The deacons felt that it was a very good evangelistic series and had some of the best attendance ever.

Fall Spiritual Life Meetings – One thought came from a mailing we received in December from the AFLC Dept. of Evangelism and Discipleship. They have a workshop on Living Out Your Faith in a Post Christian World. Perhaps this would be a good idea for the fall? Pastor will look into it.

Confirmation – The three students who are being confirmed are turning in remnants of outstanding work. Two of our first-year students are done, while the other two have a few small items left to complete. One of them needs to make up the final quiz.

Pastor is planning for next fall's Wednesday night Bible study and adult Sunday School. He has gotten a couple of suggestions as possibilities that would work if we did a couple of series of smaller studies (Role of men and women, especially in the context of the family, and another on the Holy Spirit). We also have the study, sent to us by the AFLC, on the Biblical foundation of the Fundamental Principles. Finally, He has been considering studying the writings of Luke (his gospel and Acts), one in Sunday School and the other on Wednesday nights. The Luke idea appealed to us, but we left it in his hands.

Steve F. has an idea to begin a men's accountability group, targeted at working men, which would meet for lunch once a month. The Deacons thought this sounded good.

Youth ministry update- Cody explained the Easter Breakfast and thought the full meal would continue in the future. Attended Hazen youth task force and campus days. Met with two youth for book club, and one for discipleship training. Fly plans are going well with 12 youth and 3 chaperones. Plans are being made for a fire pit and volleyball court on the back lots.

Trustees – Bruce Neuberger

Bruce was going to start the sprinkler system but now that it rained, he will wait a bit. The lawn mower was worked on. Bruce asked about how often the 2 north lots should be mowed and the council felt it could be mowed once a month or so.

The shingles are redone on the Van Garage. When the contractor put the new shingles on, he said they were adhering already since it was warmer.

Christian Ed – Angie Wanzek

VBS: May 30th-June 3rd. Theme is Keepers of the Kingdom. We confirmed meal plans, crafts, we still need teachers and lots of helpers for all tasks.

Confirmation: We will be taking our own pictures; Parents will do their own. Flowers and gifts are ordered. Angie is ordering the cake.

Graduation gifts: Angie ordered these.

End of the Year Event: FMSC will serve muffins and juice. Sunday school kids will be singing. We will have graduation and teacher recognition. Puppets will perform.

New Business: Sunday school times/length will stay the same.

OLD BUSINESS

Van Storage – Bruce Neuberger reported that we have the keys and the doors lock. We are on the list for Olson Electric and Bruce expects that the electrical work to connect to the new Van Garage will be started soon

Locking of Doors -

We discussed having a survey for the congregation asking them what they prefer - to lock the doors during church services or leave them unlocked like they are currently.

Decided that the survey would only have two questions – to lock or not to lock – and have a place for comments

Office Coordinator Darcee Wenning will order the Ring doorbells when we decide which ones we want and ask her to order them.

NEW BUSINESS

Joe Larson Housing for June – Council approved prorating Joe's salary, rent and utilities for June since he will not be moving until early June.

Youth Fire Pit – Youth Director Cody Halverson had a Fire Pit proposal he presented to the council. The fire pit would be west of the new garage on our original lots. He talked to Jim Wenning about fire code so it would be located far enough away from the new garage.

He would like this to be a joint project, with the youth group helping as they can; with labor and funding, looking to bless the congregation as a whole with this project.

The youth have already agreed to put the time in as available to make this a reality. The youth group is also willing to spend \$200 or the \$800 to help with the cost.

Tithe – We voted to split our Tithe of \$3,473.85: \$1,000 to the Youth Group for their fire pit proposal and \$2,473.85 to AFLC Seminary.

Valley Fair Youth Trip – Youth Director Cody Halverson challenged the Youth; 7th grade and up; to memorize 1 and 2 Peter. If they memorized both chapters, they would earn an all-expense trip to Valley Fair in Minnesota. If they memorized one chapter, the trip would be half paid. Cody thinks they have enough money in their Youth Account to take 5 kids. The council felt that the congregation would be supportive if extra money was needed.

Thank you notes were received from Steve and Glenda Kvale who are AFLC Missionaries on loan with Wycliffe Bible Translators for our prayers and a financial gift in November. Also received thank you notes for prayers and financial gifts from AFLC World Missions, Free Lutheran Bible College & Seminary, AFLC Headquarters and AFLC Evangelism & Discipleship. Romans 15:4–7 (ESV) — 4 For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through <u>endurance</u> and through the <u>encouragement</u> of the Scriptures we might have <u>hope</u>. 5 May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live in such **harmony** with one another, in accord with Christ Jesus, 6 that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. 7 Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.

In my first newsletter article after arriving here, I focused on three words from this text: instruction, harmony, and welcome. As Sarah and I prepare to move in the coming days, I wanted to share about endurance, encouragement, and hope.

Internship year may only be a year, but it can be a test of endurance. How do I stay strong when funerals and crises fill up the usual schedule? Where do I find the strength to speak the Word of God when I am utterly exhausted? When will we find out something concrete about our future? Endurance was a lesson well-taught during this year, because the call for endurance was bolstered by encouragement.

Encouragement through your prayers. Encouragement through times of rest. Encouragement through fellowship and joys to balance out the sorrows. Encouragement through the Scriptures as my own heart was ministered to so that I could share the Word. Dear saints, you have been a constant source of encouragement as I have learned the joys and burdens of ministry. This encouragement gives me hope.

Hope in the faithful promises of God that His Word is the active force in my ministry. Hope that not every week will be complete chaos, but that God calls us to walk faithfully one day at a time. Hope that the Word we share will bear fruit even in what may seem to be the darkest or most barren of places. Hope that all of the efforts and training will be worth it when the Gospel has done its work on hearts and minds and we are all united as one in the restored Kingdom of God.

Thank you all for teaching me endurance. Thank you for your encouragement in words and Scripture. Thank you for reminding me of the hope of life now and eternal life in Christ. You have been faithful in your call to train me to serve, so I will seek by the grace of God to be faithful in my service. On June 4th, I will discover if that service will officially be at Pipestone, MN. If the congregation says yes, then we will Lordwilling load up a truck in the afternoon on that Friday the 9th and depart on the 10th for the next step of this journey. Without your prayers, generosity, and encouragement, this would not have been possible.

But the Lord who has been working through you has been faithful to carry out His work in preparing our hearts for ministry. So thank you again for your part in this larger picture. I pray that you will continue to support you sister congregations in Trinity Parish and learn to love my dear friend, the incoming Pastor Scott. I'm sure he will be just as blessed by those saints and all of you as I have been. Whenever we see each other next, be it during a visit or in the heavenly kingdom, I will be ready to greet you with joy and praise God again for your love for me and Sarah. As you endure, know that your lives are an encouragement to us about the hope of Christ and His great mercies. Thank you, dear Prince of Peace family!
